With the Washington Senate set to release their proposed budget any day now, legislators have warned the affordable housing and homelessness community to expect the worst. The state already has a number of innovative programs that are effectively keeping our most vulnerable residents off the streets and successfully helping those already on the streets into stable housing. But without the necessary funding, these productive programs could end, which would be disastrous for Washington's most vulnerable.

This is an opportunity for you to learn about the state's safety net programs that work to create more affordable homes and to transition *families*, *schoolchildren*, *veterans*, *seniors*, and *people with disabilities* into housing. We'll also discuss just how much money will be needed in the budget to ensure these programs can continue their positive outcomes.
